MitoCanada supports bright futures

We want to help students living with mitochondrial disease pursue their education, and ultimately the careers, they dream of. In 2022, we introduced **MitoScholars.**

These scholarships were so successful that we brought them back in 2023. This year, MitoCanada will be awarding 4 scholarships (2 **MitoScholars** and 2 **MitoScholars+)** to Canadian students affected by mito.

These scholarships support:

- students living with mito (MitoScholars) overcome financial barriers they may face in pursuing a post-secondary career, while managing their condition, and
- students with a parent or sibling with a mito diagnosis (MitoScholars+). The family may face financial barriers that limit their ability to support the student pursuing their postsecondary education

How it works....

- The application portal opens on MitoCanada.org on March 15, 2024 and closes on June 28, 2024.
- Applications are reviewed by a selection committee comprised of community leaders, health experts, and individuals with lived mito experience
- Awardees are selected and notified in July

Who Can Apply...

All applicants must meet all of the criteria listed below:

- be a citizen or permanent resident of Canada
- have a formal mitochondrial disease diagnosis or be a child living with a parent/sibling with a mitochondrial disease diagnosis.
- be pursuing a certificate, diploma, associate, undergraduate or graduate degree from a Canadian university, college or trade school
- be enrolled in or awaiting acceptance from a Canadian-based, post-secondary educational institution for the 2024 fall semester

Scholarships must be applied to the following expenses:

- tuition
- student fees
- required educational materials and/or
- on-site residency
